HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS



PRACTICE STREET SAFETY

- Remind children to look both ways before crossing the street, use crosswalks, and stay on sidewalks whenever possible.
- Drive slowly with your lights on. Be on the lookout for children crossing the street quickly in undesignated crossing areas.

BE VISIBLE

- Only approach well-lit homes with a porch light on. Never enter a stranger's home or a vehicle.
- Carry a flashlight or add reflective tape to costumes and treat buckets.

TRICK OR TREAT IN A GROUP

- Use the buddy system and be sure children stay with a responsible adult.
- Designate a meetup spot or plan in case you get separated.

TREATS

- Wait to eat any treats at home so you can closely examine for spoiled or unwrapped items.
- Avoid eating homemade treats. Only eat packaged and sealed treats.

COSTUME SAFETY

- Try on costumes early. Be sure costumes and shoes fit properly to avoid tripping.
- Apply makeup in a small area ahead of time, to be sure no reaction occurs.

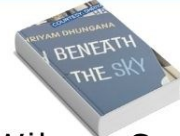

WILSON COUNTY TEEN PUBLISHES BOOK AFTER MOVING FROM OVERSEAS

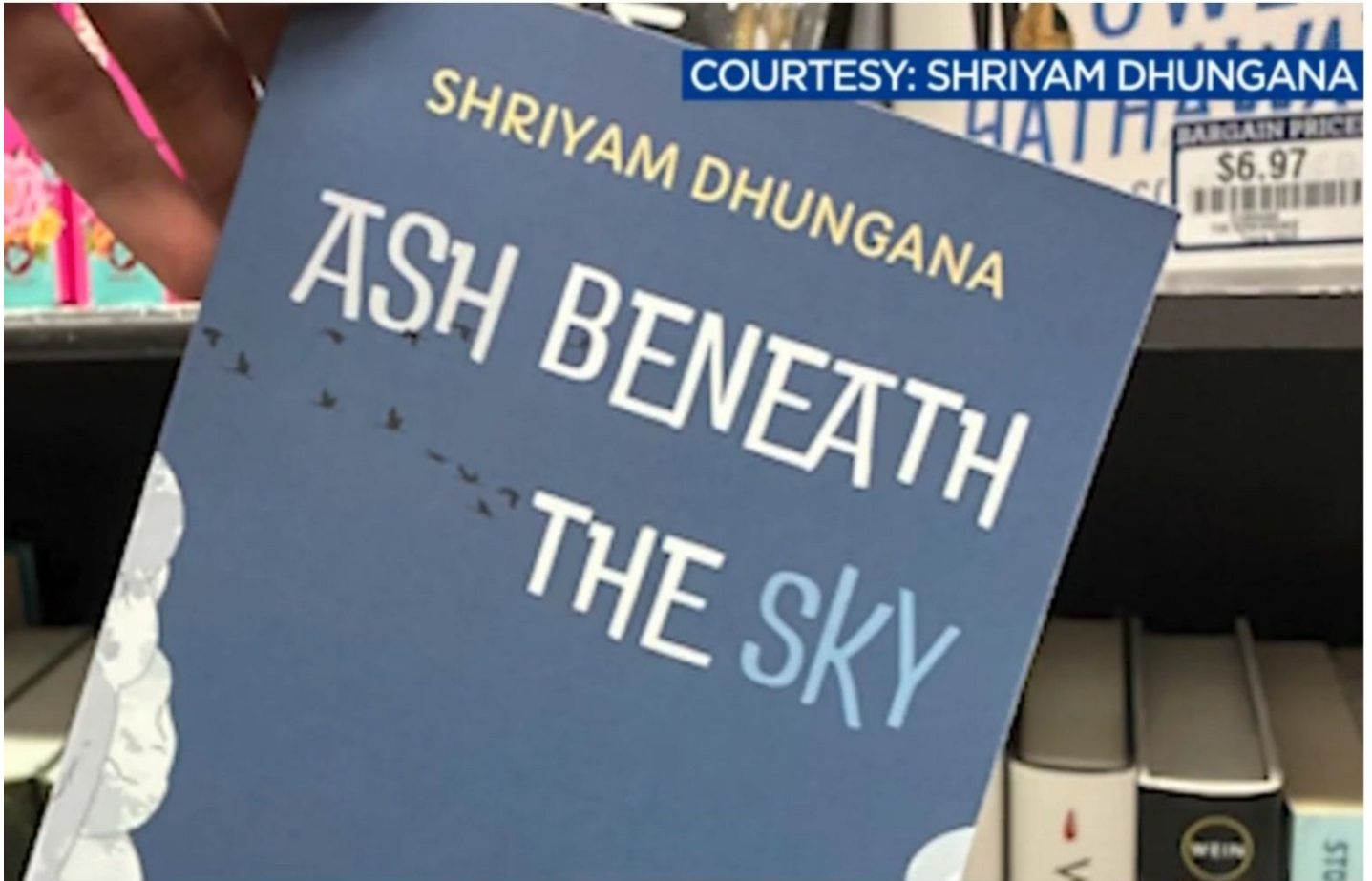

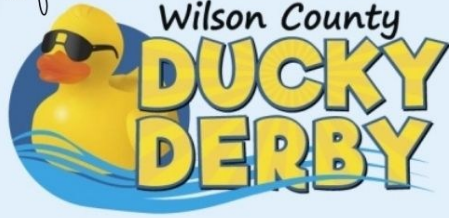

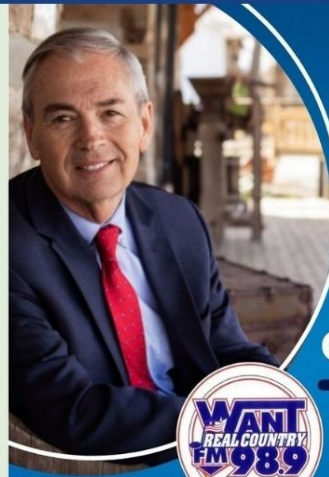

TN PROMISE APPLICATIONS ARE NOW OPEN FOR THE CLASS OF 2026!

The Tennessee Higher Education Commission (THEC) has officially opened the Tennessee Promise application for the high school graduating Class of 2026. Students can apply now at CollegeforTN.org/tnpromise. The deadline to submit applications is Monday, November 3, 2025.

Tennessee Promise is one of the state's landmark college-access initiatives, offering eligible students' tuition-free education at Tennessee's 13 community colleges, 23 TCAT campuses, and select four-year institutions that offer associate degree programs. Importantly, while Cumberland University is a private four-year university, it participates fully in TN Promise—accepting the state tuition rate for students enrolling in its two-year associate degree programs.

Located right here in Lebanon, Cumberland University uniquely blends the benefits of a small-campus university environment with the affordability of TN Promise. Students can complete a two-year associate degree tuition-free under Tennessee Promise and, through Cumberland's "2-to-4" transition, move seamlessly into a bachelor's program—often supported further by scholarships such as the Phoenix or Cumberland Promise to reduce costs for the remaining two years.

This initiative also serves as the gateway to Tennessee's new Direct Admissions Pilot Program, which will automatically admit eligible seniors into in-state public and private colleges—including Cumberland—based on academic data. This simplifies and accelerates the college enrollment process.

As always, Tennessee Promise isn't just financial aid—it includes mentorship, community service requirements (16 hours per year), and academic support via partners like tnAchieves and The Ayers Foundation Trust. Cumberland further enhances support with dedicated retention staff, academic advising, and help navigating TN Promise requirements on campus.

Last year brought record-breaking applications statewide, and THEC hopes to exceed that milestone again with the Class of 2026. With Cumberland University right here in Lebanon accepting TN Promise students into its associate degree program, local students have a fantastic opportunity to pursue higher education tuition-free, enjoy a rich campus life, and continue toward a four-year degree—all with built-in support and affordability.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR THOSE AFFECTED BY HURRICANE HELENE

It's been one year since the devastating Hurricane Helene. The TN Department of Revenue announced that folks impacted by the storm could be eligible for a sales tax refund through the Natural Disaster Sales Tax Relief program. Claimants may request a refund of Tennessee sales tax paid on certain items purchased to replace damaged or destroyed items. Claimants must provide documentation verifying the assistance they received from FEMA. Survivors have a year after receiving their FEMA letter to apply. A free webinar was held in September to discuss eligibility and requirements. The webinar was recorded and can be found on TN Dept. of Revenue's website at www.tn.gov/revenue along with other helpful information.

FREE FLU SHOTS!

The Wilson County Health Department of the Tennessee Department of Health will be providing free flu shots, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., on Tuesday, Oct. 21, 2025, participating in the statewide 2025 Fight Flu prevention effort.

We want to protect people in our communities from the flu and receiving your annual flu shot is the best way to protect yourself and those around you. No appointments will be needed to receive a free flu vaccine and flu vaccine will be free to anyone who wants to receive it at the Wilson County Health Department and all other local health departments across the state on October 21st, 2025.

Free flu shots will also be available in the Education Building over at the fairgrounds on that same day, where there will also be community partners with resources, free car seat inspections by our trained CHANT team, and a coat drive so that we can help and prepare anyone that might need a layer or two to keep them warm in the cold weather to come. This event will be from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

The flu virus is highly contagious and pregnant women, infants, the elderly, and people with certain medical conditions are at the highest risk of severe complications from the flu. To prevent the spread of the flu virus to others, follow precautions such as proper hygiene and handwashing, cover your coughs or sneezes with a tissue or your elbow, and stay at home if you are sick.

Participants that are interested in getting their free flu shot just need to park, walk into the health department or the education building at the fairgrounds, fill out some

paperwork, and then a nurse will administer the shot. All participants will have to wait 15 minutes in case of an adverse reaction, and then they will be good to go.

REAL ID

The REAL ID Act of 2005 established minimum security standards for license issuance and production. These standards provide an additional level of security to protect your identity. It also prohibits Federal agencies from accepting driver licenses and ID cards from states that do not meet the Act's minimum standards. Beginning May 7, 2025, everyone must have a REAL ID license or passport to enter certain Federal buildings, military bases and nuclear power plants or board commercial flights within the United States.

How to make an appointment for real id?

Federal law requires REAL ID applications to be made in person. If you have a Tennessee Driver License or ID, you can apply for a REAL ID at a Driver Services Center or participating County Clerks. If you do not have a Tennessee Driver License or ID, you can apply for a REAL ID at a full-service Driver Services Center.
