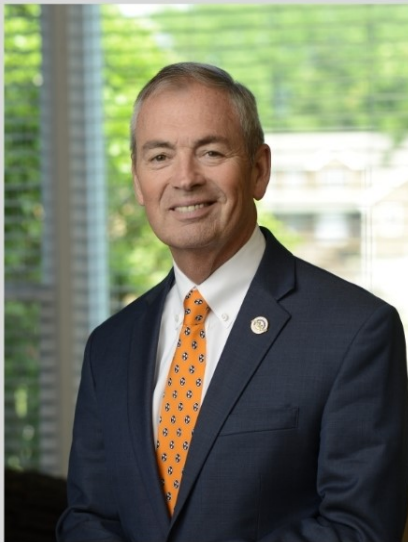

JULY 7TH DEADLINE APPROACHES FOR FEDERAL DISASTER ASSISTANCE

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (FEMA):

Homeowners and renters in Davidson, Williamson and Wilson counties with damage or other losses caused by the storms that struck from March 25 through April 2 have only a short time left to apply for FEMA assistance. **The deadline for applications is July 7, 2021.** However, those who have already received determination letters from FEMA and don't agree with the decision, can appeal within 60 days of the date on the letter. Those who have questions about making an appeal can call the FEMA Helpline at 800-621- 3362 (TTY 800-462-7585). Those who wish to apply by the July 7th deadline can also call the Helpline.

So far, over \$880,000 in FEMA grants has been awarded to individuals and households and over \$1.98 million in low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration were provided to homeowners and renters. Loans may also be available to businesses of all sizes and some nonprofit organizations to cover losses not fully compensated by insurance.

There are several ways to apply:

Following are several ways to apply for FEMA assistance:

- Download FEMA's mobile app. For information, go to: fema.gov/mobile-app.
- Visit DisasterAssistance.gov.
- Call the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362 (TTY 800-462-7585). Multilingual operators are available, and lines are open daily from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Central Time. Those who use a relay service such as a videophone, InnoCaption or CapTel should provide FEMA with their specific phone number assigned to that service.

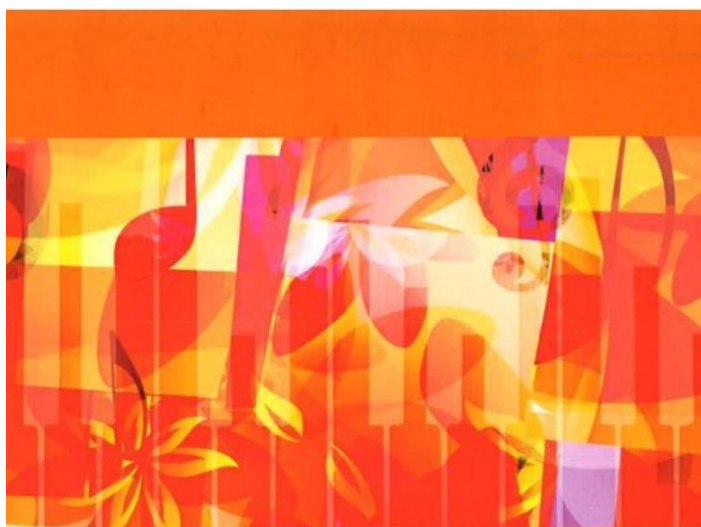

Beginning in 1995, the Watertown Jazz Festival has become an annual event, taking place each year, with the exception of 2020. Now that the festival is back, there are some great acts planned to make up for lost time! There will be nine acts throughout the day, from 1:00PM-10:00PM. Musicians Bob McChesney and Darryl Gleen Nettles will perform. Numerous bands, such as the Nashville Jazz Orchestra, the Vantrease Jazz Band, and Jerry Krahn's Fat Tuesday Dixieland Jazz Band will also perform. "Our main goal is to have good solid, listenable jazz," said Mr. John Jewell, Event Coordinator. The Jazz Alliance, the Boro Red Hot Jazz Majors, the Cumberland University Alumni Jazz Band, and Music City Swing are also on the list to perform. LOVE BEAR MINISTRY, INC. BRINGS COMFORT TO COMMUNITIES FAR AND WIDE

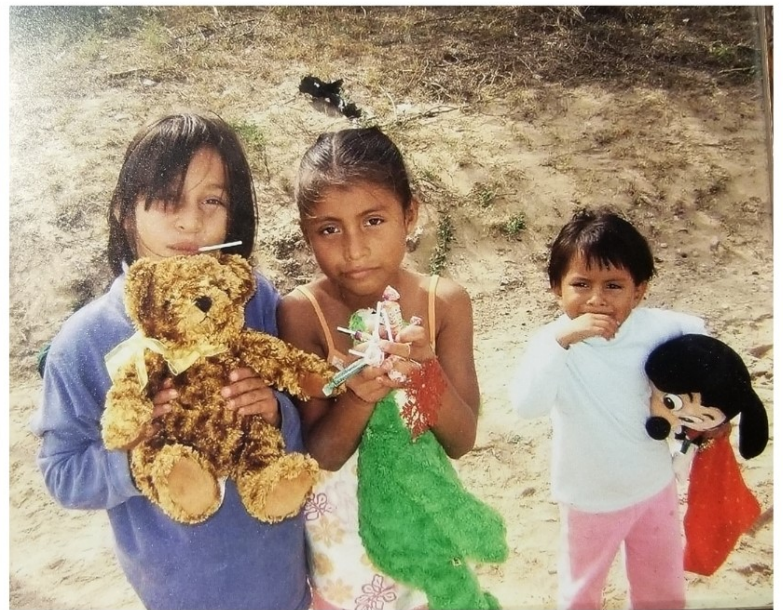
There are all kinds of non-profits here in Middle Tennessee, and we are grateful for the contributions they make to our communities. One locally based non-profit focuses on bringing comfort to those who need it, but it is in a unique way that most people wouldn't expect...It's through giving away stuffed teddy bears!

Love Bear Ministries first began in 2008, but it didn't become an official non-profit organization until 2011. Founded by Ms. Brenda Burgett, the non-profit aims to comfort those who are hurting by offering them a teddy bear. The organization has furnished children and adults around the world with physical and emotional special needs with thousands of the traditional cuddly toys. Since 2008, over 35,000 bears have been given away to those in need. By working with mission trips, hospitals, senior living units, orphanages, and other organizations, Love Bear Ministries, Inc. literally "gives back" to anyone who is living in difficult circumstances and needs a little bit of comfort in their day.

Like all non-profits, Love Bear Ministries, Inc. relies on donations. Over the years, there have been plenty of times where the ministry's supply would be completely diminished, and calls would come in for large amounts of bears. But through donations and a touch of grace, the needs were somehow always met. "Miracles have come out of this," said Brenda Burgett, Founder. "Where there's a need, God always seems to supply us."

Since 2020, we've heard of how the pandemic affected our businesses, schools, and first responders, but we haven't heard much about how it affected our local non-profit organizations. While Love Bear Ministries, Inc. accepts donations year-round, in 2020 the organization received very few donations compared to years past. If you would like to make a donation or host a Bear Sunday at your church, Ms. Brenda asks that you give her a call on her cell phone at 615-947-7740. Remember, donated teddy bears must be new or 'like-new'.

If you are a church or an organization in need of bears, give Ms. Brenda a call and let her know the amount that you will need. She will ask that you write a brief letter requesting that specific amount along with a description of how the bears will be distributed. From there, she'll get you taken care of. And who knows...you may witness a miracle along the way!

RACING RETURNS TO THE NASHVILLE SUPERSPEEDWAY

The Nashville Superspeedway is back! During Father's Day weekend, the superspeedway opened its gates to fans for the first time in over ten years. The enthusiastic race fans arrived in droves for the first NASCAR Cup Series Race in Nashville in thirty-seven years! On Friday, fans entered the superspeedway grounds for the Rackley Roofing 200, where Mayor Hutto was honored to serve as the Grand Marshal during the pre-race ceremonies. The Ally 400 was held on Saturday, and by Sunday, nearly 38,000 people were in the stands, ready to cheer on the drivers.

We have all heard of the phrase "it takes a village," when it comes to child rearing, but it is rarely thought of when hosting a NASCAR race. During the race weekend, multiple organizations came together in order to keep those on the track as well as those in the stands as safe as possible.

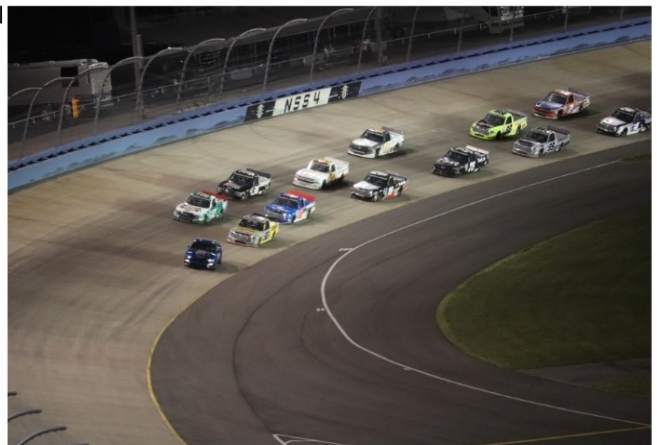
Upon entry into the superspeedway, the Wilson County Sheriff's Department was present to direct traffic, and the Wilson County Convention and Visitors Bureau (a.k.a. Tourism Department) staff were present to welcome visitors into our area. Vanderbilt Corporate Health and Wellness staff were also on-site to offer the Johnson & Johnson vaccine to the race fans.

Multiple agencies were prepared to provide emergency medical services both on the track and in the stands. The Wilson County Emergency Management Agency (W.E.M.A.) sent multiple staff members, as well as three ambulances, a fire truck, and three medical/fire UTV's. Likewise, fifty-five EMS providers from Vanderbilt Wilson County Hospital were on-site. Vanderbilt Lifeflight was prepared in advance with a helicopter, four ambulances, four physicians, a nurse practitioner, and several other medical providers. A fully staffed mobile emergency communications center was staffed with W.E.M.A. and Lifeflight personnel to ensure a prompt multi-agency response.

This last Father's Day weekend, it truly "took a village" to carry out an event of this scale and ensure safety for all in attendance. We care for one another here in Wilson County, and during the opening race weekend it was shown through the hard work and dedication of so many individuals and entities. The Wilson County Mayor's Office would like to thank the Superspeedway President, Mr. Erik Moses and his team, as well as the Vanderbilt Wilson County Hospital, W.E.M.A., Wilson County Sheriff's and Tourism Departments, the staff that worked to ensure a successful and safe weekend, and last but not least—the fans for making it possible! Welcome back, Nashville Superspeedway! We look forward to watching some great races from the track.

TN DEPT. OF HEALTH ANNOUNCES WALK-IN OPTIONS FOR COVID-19 VACCINE

The Tennessee Department of Health announced that local health departments, including offsite points of distribution, or PODs, are offering walk-in options to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

Tennesseans ages 16 and up are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. Children ages 12-15 are approved to receive the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine. The Tennessee Department of Health wants to make it as convenient as possible for anyone seeking a COVID-19 vaccine to receive one. Important Message from TDOT

The Tennessee Department of Transportation is working to repair the bridge along Interstate 40 at State Route 171 (Mt. Juliet Road).

During the bridge repair work, lane conditions on I-40 and Mt. Juliet Road will be as follows.

- I-40 West – three lanes only (lanes reduced on approach to the interchange)
- Mt. Juliet Road North – three lanes only (lane restriction on overpass only
 - two turn lanes to I-40 West
 - one through lane to Mt. Juliet Road North
- I-40 East to Mt. Juliet Road North (Exit 226B) – yield to Mt. Juliet Road traffic (no free flow movement)

As always, drivers are reminded to use all motorist information tools wisely and *Know Before You Go!* by checking travel conditions before leaving for your destination. Drivers should never text, tweet, or talk on a cell phone while behind the wheel.

VANDERBILT LIFEFLIGHT HOSTS RIBBON CUTTING FOR GROUND EMS STATION

We have many real-life heroes here in Wilson County, and several of them are ready to aid us in times of an emergency. During the autumn of 2011, Vanderbilt LifeFlight Ground EMS was established, and now it assists the Discharge Transport office to transport patients from Vanderbilt University Medical Center to other facilities via ambulance. On June 24, 2021 a ribbon cutting was held for the new ground LifeFlight EMS station on West Baddour Parkway. The new station will hold the LifeFlight ambulance, which will assist with transporting patients from the Vanderbilt Wilson County Hospital to other nearby hospitals. This move will help support the ambulance services of Wilson County Emergency Management Agency (WEMA) so they will have more availability to respond to emergency calls throughout the county. The license plate is part of the unique identity of Wilson County and would proudly be displayed on vehicles in our county and state.



Sales to Benefit Wilson Rides, Inc.

Sales of the license plate will benefit our local non-profit Wilson Rides Inc., an organization who helps to preserve the quality of life and foster a connected community for older adults in Wilson County by providing safe transportation to local destinations.



Sign up now!

You can help make these license plates available in Wilson County by taking part in the pre-sale. **Plates will only be produced once 1,000 signatures and \$35 per plate are collected!** Plates will be mailed to the County Clerk, and you will be notified by mail by the Tennessee Department of Revenue, Vehicle Services Division when your specialty license plate is available. Usual license registrations fees apply, and your specialty plate fee of \$35 will have been pre-paid.



How to Register
