

Hamilton Springs Grand Opening

Regional Transportation Authority of Middle Tennessee (RTA) officials and Wilson County leaders officially celebrated the new Music City Star train station in Hamilton Springs on September 4th marking the beginning of train operations for the state's first transit-oriented development (TOD).

RTA CEO Steve Bland, Wilson County Mayor and RTA Vice Chair Randall Hutto, City of Lebanon Mayor Bernie Ash, Horn Springs Group Developer Jack Bell, and Lebanon Ward 6 City Councilor Rick Bell gathered to commemorate the train station, which officially came online and began serving passengers boarding at Hamilton Springs on Monday, August 27.

"The new Hamilton Springs Station is just one more example of the tremendous growth we are experiencing in Lebanon," City of Lebanon Mayor Bernie Ash said. "We are grateful for the foresight of the Bell family in creating a transit oriented development that will benefit the citizens of Lebanon for years to come."

The Hamilton

Springs Station covers 3.2 acres and is a central part of the TOD – a community that has been planned, designed, and constructed to emphasize



the use of transportation modes other than cars. The station serves residents of the Hamilton Springs community as well as other residents of Wilson County, thanks to



a Park & Ride with 160 lighted parking spaces next to the train station.

"It is an exciting day for RTA and Wilson County as we welcome a 4th Music City Star sta-

tion to Wilson County and a 7th station along the East Corridor Line," Wilson County Mayor and RTA Vice Chair Randall Hutto said. "The

addition of Hamilton Springs is further proof that transit is booming in our region and we are proud to be able to provide another viable option for new and veteran

riders traveling to downtown Nashville. We are very excited to continue to watch Hamilton Springs grow and thrive."

The station is a

total investment of \$4.1 million, not including the generous land donation by Jack Bell and Rick Bell. It is a true regional partnership of several agencies and organizations, including the RTA, the Federal Transit Administration, the Nashville Area Metropolitan Planning Organization, the City of Lebanon, TDOT's Long-Range Planning Division, and Horn Springs Development, Inc.

"It is hard to believe it was a little over a year ago that we were celebrating the groundbreaking of this station and the moment where the region's first transit-oriented development took its first step from drawings and dreams toward rail and reality," RTA CEO Steve Bland said. "As Middle Tennessee continues to experience unprecedented growth, transit-oriented development projects like Hamilton Springs are essential to provide increased mobility options through the creation of livable, walkable communities that encourage riding the train and other multi-modal transportation options."






WILSON COUNTY ELECTION COMMISSION

This month the Wilson County Connection highlights the office of the Wilson County Election Commission. Made up of four employees: Administrator, Phillip Warren, Assistant Administrator Tammy Smith and Deputies Melia Anderson and Kathryn McClesky not to mention 350 dedicated poll officials; it is the Mission of the Wilson County Election Commission to ensure the integrity of every vote cast in Wilson County by administering election law and procedures equally and fairly to all, by providing the most efficient, accurate and secure election process possible, and, in all our endeavors, to exceed the expectations of the voters, taxpayers and citizens of Wil-

son County in accountability and competence.

The Administrator is appointed by the five-member county Election Commission. The county Election Commissioners

County and Municipal elections for the voters of Wilson County. The Election Commission is responsible for voter registration, campaign finance filings, and many other daily activities all to protect

every vote cast by Wilson County voters is top priority. Wilson County is one of the first jurisdictions in the nation to have a voter verified paper trail voting system. Introduced in August of 2016, the Express Vote voting system has increased voter confidence and streamlined the voting experience during Early Voting and on Election day. Cybersecurity has become an integral part of the employees work at the

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The administration of elections is an area of public service that is constantly changing. Protecting the integrity of

Election Commission. Working closely with state and federal officials they work daily to improve, maintain and monitor all the technological components of the office to ensure fair and honest elections with no outside influ-

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and streamlined the voting experience during Early Voting and on Election day. Cybersecurity has become an integral part of the employees work at the Election Commission. Working closely with state and federal officials they work daily to improve, maintain and monitor all the technological components of the office to ensure fair and honest elections with no outside influence. No part of the voting system is ever connected to the internet or can be accessed by wireless devices. Voter registration is a daily task that protects each vote. The Election Commission staff processes over 1500 new voter registrations, address changes, duplicate registrations and other registration maintenance activities each month. They maintain the records of over 80,000 eligible voters in Wilson County and that number grows each day.

In 2011, the Election Commission

with support from the county began restoration of the Old Lebanon Post Office. The Grand Opening for the Post Office was on March 30th, 1915 and on March 30th, 2015 a Tennessee Historical marker was unveiled commemorating the 100th anniversary. Renovating the Old Post Office for continued use as a public building proved to be a significant cost savings over the cost of a new building.

Streamlining work processes in the office and utilizing technology to enhance traditional record creation, maintenance and retention has increased the ability to meet the increasing workload of a growing county.

The Election Commission website www.WilsonVotes.com has information about every aspect of elections and voting. The information is kept current and is easily accessible 24/7. The Petition page, Sample Ballot, Early Vot-

ing Daily Report, Election Night Reporting and other election specific pages are visited by interested voters regularly. The Election Commission's goal is to provide information voters in Wilson County want and need in an easy-to-find format. For those that want in-depth information about elections, voting and elected offices, we have an award-winning

Voter Handbook available free on our website. The Handbook is updated for each election cycle.

We supported 27 school elections in 2017. Each year the number of school elections increases. The office, also, welcomes the opportunity to give presentations to interested groups on any election related topic. Over the past several years we have had

the great pleasure of addressing many diverse groups in Wilson County to inform and educate them about elections and voting. A phone call or email is all it takes to arrange a presentation for your group, club or organization.

THE TENNESSEE MANEUVERS EXPERIENCE

From 1941 to 1944, the U.S. Army conducted seven large-scale maneuvers across Middle Tennessee in 21 counties, including Wilson. Cumberland University, in Lebanon, served as the Army's headquarters.

850,000 soldiers took part in the simulated combat operations that prepared them for the D-Day invasion and to push back the German forces. These massive maneuvers took place on the hills, the hollows and along the rivers of Middle Tennessee.

Our soldiers made history because such massive exercises had never been conducted. Military leaders agree, the skills learned and refined here played

a significant role in the Allied Forces victory.

The soldiers, landowners and observers deserve to have their stories preserved. The *Tennessee Maneuvers Experience* is going to do just that with an engaging program now in the development.

The Tennessee Maneuvers Experience will retrace these epic events in an immersive, educational presentation utilizing stage sets, lighting, and audio/visual technologies for a captivating experience in a theater configuration. In this show, stage performance and documentary film are merged to bring a program that is both historically accurate and entertaining.

Our story is born from first person accounts that transport us 75 years into our past. Audiences will hear, see and experience the reactions of a typical, rural Tennessee family when their lives are forever changed as the events of WWI and the maneuvers unfold around them.

The Friends of Wilson County Veterans Museum, a 501 (c) (3) corporation, is undertaking this as its first project. *Join us for our fund-raising event and see a 15-minute preview of work in production in the making of The Tennessee Maneuvers Experience.* The dollars raised will allow us to complete the presentation and purchase the video and sound equip-

ment. Once a venue is chosen, we will offer the presentation to school students and to the public as a tourist attraction for Wilson County.

POW/MIA RECOGNITION DAY

On September 21, the Associates of Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 1004 hosted a POW/MIA Recognition Day ceremony in honor and remembrance of our nation's prisoners of war and those missing in action. Patrons gathered for the event in Wilson County at the Wilson County Veterans Museum. The ceremony was highlighted by the Missing Man Table Ceremony, which symbolizes those who have not returned home, as well as stories from the son an MIA serviceman and a former POW. City of Lebanon Mayor Ber-

nie Ash read a proclamation proclaiming the day as POW/MIA Recognition Day in Lebanon. Wilson County Mayor,

and their families. All military installations fly the National League of Families' POW/MIA flag, which symbolizes

MIA Recognition Day. United States flags and POW/MIA flags are flown on this day and joint prayers are made for POWs and those missing in action. National POW/MIA Recognition Day posters are also displayed at college or university campuses and public buildings to promote the day. Remembrance ceremonies and other events to observe the day are also held in places such as the Pentagon, war memorials and museums.



Randall Hutto as well as Tn State Governor Bill Haslam also drafted resolutions for the event. Many Americans across the United States pause to remember the sacrifices and service of those who were prisoners of war (POW), as well as those who are missing in action (MIA),

the nation's remembrance of those who were imprisoned while serving in conflicts and those who remain missing. Veteran rallies take place in many states, such as Wisconsin, in the United States on National POW/



Game-Day Express

The Game-day Express is back for the Tennessee Titans 2018 season.

The Game-Day Express train will operate for all Tennessee Titans regular season home games, beginning with the September 16 game against the Houston Texans. Service begins in Lebanon with stops in Martha, Hamilton Springs, Mt. Juliet, Hermitage, and Donelson before arriving in downtown Nashville.

Tickets for the September 16 and 30 games will go on sale Tuesday, Sep-

tember 4. Tickets for the remaining games in October, November, and December will be released prior to each month for purchase.

Round-trip train tickets for all Titans regular season home games are \$10 each, allowing fans to travel responsibly and enjoy the game without stress over parking prices and downtown traffic. Children age 4 and younger will not need a ticket to board; however, they are required to sit in a parent's lap.

Tickets must be acquired in ad-

vance by going online to MusicCityStar.org or TicketsNashville.com.

Tickets are not available for purchase on the train on game days. Weekday Music City Star tickets and passes are not valid on the Game-Day Express train.

For noon games, the Music City Star will operate the schedule listed below:

Parking is free at all of the outlying

stations and passengers may tailgate at the outlying train stations prior to the game as well as on the train. In addition, they may bring small coolers onboard and leave them on the train upon arrival at Riverfront Station.

Customer Service Training




