The University of Tennessee honored

Angela Floyd, Samantha Knowles and Amber Rowland as Certified Public Ad-

ministrators at a Capstone event at Montgomery Bell State Park on May 18th.

Ms. Audrey Joines also completed the program and received her certification on June 20th.

To achieve the designation, a participant must complete 80 credit hours in the County Officials Certificate Training Program (COCTP). The program is administered by the UT County Technical Assistance Service (CTAS) and is available to every county

official and county employee in the state. “This is a unique program that offers a broad spectrum of training to county officials and employees to provide them with the knowledge to better serve their constituents,” said Robin Roberts, executive director of CTAS. CTAS is an agency of

the statewide UT Institute for Public Service.

Each course in the program is designed to aid county government officials in performing their jobs and efficiently administering county services. Classroom topics include ethics, fire insurance ratings, finance, records man-

agement, proactive leadership, and information technology proficiency.

“Some courses are tailored for a specific office, while others cover general managerial and governmental functions,” Roberts said. “The entire program is designed for practicality and to build skills the

officials need every day to better serve their constituents.”

Congratulations to these ladies we appreciate everything you do for the citizens of Wilson County.



Spotlight on the office of...

WILSON COUNTY FINANCE

The finance department was created under the County Financial Management System of 1981 to, “administer the finances of the county for all funds of the various departments, agencies and boards that are handled by the county trustee.” “The finance department shall be responsible for purchasing, accounting, budgeting, payroll, cash management and other such financial matters of the county ...”

The Wilson County Finance Department has a number of responsibilities. The finance department processes the payroll checks for all employees of Wilson County government except for those fee offices that have elected to prepare their own payroll. They also work with the Property Assessor to determine the amount of growth money available to provide raises or enhancements to existing county services. The benefits department works directly with county employees on insurance claims, and with the insurance committee, outside advisors, and the county commission to provide the best and most affordable health insurance program possible for the employees of this county and their families. First and foremost, it is the duty of the finance department to establish procedures to ensure that opportunities for fraud, waste, and abuse are minimized in the disbursement process. We are responsible for monitoring compliance with the budget established by the

county commission and ensuring the accuracy of financial reporting of Wilson County government. Normal purchasing policies and procedures require multiple levels of approval to help ensure that what is being purchased is needed and funds have been set aside for the purchase. All expendi-

is always looking for ways to improve their department to better serve Wilson County’s employees and citizens. Currently, they are in the process of upgrading the accounting and financial reporting software which should allow more effective and efficient service to the various departments of

deemed appropriate.

The finance department currently has ten employees: Aaron Maynard, Finance Director; Sharon Lackey, Deputy Finance Director; Labraunya Horton, Assistant Deputy Finance Director; Angela Lalonde, Payroll Specialist; Teresa Scruggs, Accounts Payable Clerk; Michelle Muschler, Administrative Assistant; Joe Goode, Executive Assistant; Debbie Green, Benefits/Risk Manager; Holly Taylor, Benefits Administrator and Shelly Shaw, Benefits Specialist. The finance director is hired by the finance committee and confirmed by the county commission. *“The employees we have in place are probably the strongest group we have had in my tenure as finance director. We have a good mix of personnel with experience from the private sector and people with many years of government service. This combination allows us to constantly examine what private sector business practices have use for us in the government environment, as well as determine when some of those of practices might be prohibited by state law or just not work well for a government.”* **Aaron Maynard, Wilson County Finance Director**


“Wilson Co. Schools Announces Bus Driver Shortage”

Lebanon, TN- Once again, the Wilson County School system is in desperate need of bus drivers. While the school year started off strong, several drivers have recently been forced to retire or take medical leave, due to illness. That, combined with the increase in our student population, has created a dire situation that has forced the transportation department to cancel routes, and additional routes will likely have to be cancelled by the end of the week. All affected parents will be notified, as those decisions are made.

As you may remember, the starting pay for new drivers was recently raised to \$17/hr., with a guarantee of at least four and a half hours per day. Drivers who have previous experience, and a CDL license, will be paid in accordance with the following salary schedule:

0-3 years: **\$17/hr.**
4-9 years: **\$20/hr.**
10-15 years: **\$23/hr.**
16+ years: **\$25/hr.**

THE TENNESSEE MANEUVERS EXPERIENCE

From 1941 to 1944, the U.S. Army conducted seven large-scale maneuvers across Middle Tennessee in 21 counties, including Wilson. Cumberland University, in Lebanon, served as the Army's headquarters.

850,000 soldiers took part in the simulated combat operations that prepared them for the D-Day invasion and to push back the German forces. These massive maneuvers took place on the hills, the hollows and along the rivers of Middle Tennessee.

Our soldiers made history because such massive exercises had never been conducted. Military leaders agree, the skills learned and refined here played

a significant role in the Allied Forces victory.

The soldiers, landowners and observers deserve to have their stories preserved. The *Tennessee Maneuvers Experience* is going to do just that with an engaging program now in the development.

The Tennessee Maneuvers Experience will retrace these epic events in an immersive, educational presentation utilizing stage sets, lighting, and audio/visual technologies for a captivating experience in a theater configuration. In this show, stage performance and documentary film are merged to bring a program that is both historically accurate and entertaining.

Our story is born from first person accounts that transport us 75 years into our past. Audiences will hear, see and experience the reactions of a typical, rural Tennessee family when their lives are forever changed as the events of WWI and the maneuvers unfold around them.

The Friends of Wilson County Veterans Museum, a 501 (c) (3) corporation, is undertaking this as its first project. *Join us for our fund-raising event and see a 15-minute preview of work in production in the making of The Tennessee Maneuvers Experience.* The dollars raised will allow us to complete the presentation and purchase the video and sound equip-

ment. Once a venue is chosen, we will offer the presentation to school students and to the public as a tourist attraction for Wilson County.

DrugFree WilCo

DrugFree WilCo is a coalition dedicated to uniting the collective community of Wilson County with the mission to prevent and reduce drug misuse and addiction; and to provide education, communication and awareness of re-

sources. In 2018, a loving mother came to talk with Mayor Hutto about re-

sources for those struggling with addiction. Her story was personal; her son had tragically died from overdose. It had started with an injury and prescribed pain medicine and it ended with street pills laced with fentanyl. The Mayor gathered a group of caring professionals and community folks together

to find a way to help address the addiction problem. In July, DrugFree WilCo was formed as a coalition to fight drug addiction in Wilson County, TN. On August 31, 2018, National Overdose Awareness

of the opioid crisis, which is a statewide and national issue.

In 2017, Wilson County had a total of 125,832 opioids for pain prescriptions. With a population of 135,376 in 2017, the rate of filled opioid

The coalition includes members from many sectors of the community including law enforcement, military, county schools, Lebanon Special School District, the faith-based community, pharmacies, doctors, and many treatment centers.

A special Event Planning Committee is charged with planning educational events for the public which are tentatively scheduled for November, January 2019, and April 2019. A Resource Committee is working on identifying

existing resources which can be published and made available for referrals to appropriate treatment.

Game-Day Express

The Game-day Express is back for the Tennessee Titans 2018 season.

The Game-Day Express train will operate for all Tennessee Titans regular season home games, beginning with the September 16 game against the Houston Texans. Service begins in Lebanon with stops in Martha, Hamilton Springs, Mt. Juliet, Hermitage, and Donelson before arriving in downtown Nashville.

Tickets for the September 16 and 30 games will go on sale Tuesday, Sep-

tember 4. Tickets for the remaining games in October, November, and December will be released prior to each month for purchase.

Round-trip train tickets for all Titans regular season home games are \$10 each, allowing fans to travel responsibly and enjoy the game without stress over parking prices and downtown traffic. Children age 4 and younger will not need a ticket to board; however, they are required to sit in a parent's lap.

Tickets must be acquired in ad-

vance by going online to MusicCityStar.org or TicketsNashville.com.

Tickets are not available for purchase on the train on game days. Weekday Music City Star tickets and passes are not valid on the Game-Day Express train.

For noon games, the Music City Star will operate the schedule listed below:

For afternoon and evening games, please visit musiccitystar.org for detailed train departure information.

Parking is free at all of the outlying

stations and passengers may tailgate at the outlying train stations prior to the game as well as on the train. In addition, they may bring small coolers onboard and leave them on the train upon arrival at Riverfront Station.
